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Online bullying

The latest Keeping Safe theme deals with online bullying.

Online bullying is a topic that is often in the news and can have devastating effects on children and their families. It is vitally important that children are taught to recognise bullying and to take appropriate action if they witness or are subject to it.

The discussions that parents have with their children are most effective when parents adopt a 'no blame' approach. Children must be comfortable in recounting what has happened and not fearful of any actions or repercussions from reporting it. Whizz – Make new Friends App

Wizz is a social networking platform and is rated for 'Teens' on the Google Play store and as 12+ on the App store. It is free to download but does have in-app purchases ranging from £0.89 to £44.99.

Users swipe through the app to find people who are currently online and who they would like to chat with. Users will be chatting with strangers, which can present risks. Internet Matters have produced advice around chatting with strangers <u>here</u>.



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
